What do Virginia laws or codes say?



Basketball hoops, street hockey goals, and game equipment such as roller skates, skateboards, and other toys are not permitted on roadways. Violations of these laws may result in criminal prosecution of any person who plays in or obstructs the roadway.

Some Important Traffic Safety Facts*

Be aware of the dangers associated with playing in the street.

- In 2005, 784 pedalcyclists were killed and an additional 45,000 were injured in traffic crashes.
- Nearly one-fifth (17%) of the pedalcyclists killed in traffic crashes in 2005 were between the ages of 5 and 15.

Using bike helmets is the single most effective measure anyone can take to reduce head injuries and fatalities

What about motorized scooters, gopeds, and mopeds?

Motorized scooters, gopeds and mopeds are classified in the same category according to Virginia State Code. Therefore, they are allowed on the public roadway, and the following laws apply.



Among other things, operators must ...

- Be 16 years of age or older.
- Not ride on a sidewalk.
- Wear a helmet that is approved by the Department of Transportation.
- Wear either eye protection or have a windshield that is approved by the state superintendent (state police chief.)
- Have a white light mounted to the front.
- Have a red light or red reflector mounted to the rear visible in clear weather from a distance of not less than 500 feet when operated after sunset.
- Not operate a moped, goped, or motorized scooter while intoxicated.
- Have properly functioning brakes when operated on the highways.
- Obey road signs and traffic lights and follow the rules of the road.

Play it safe!

- Parents should educate their children about recreational safety and correct any hazardous behavior.
- Youths should play in designated playgrounds, parks, or private yards.
- When using recreational equipment, read and follow manufacturer's recommendations for use.
- Do not disable safety features.

Lights, reflectors and other safety features are there to protect the user.

- Use equipment that is age appropriate and "fits" the operator.
- Use protective gear - always!

Protective helmets, eyewear, knee and elbow pads, and gloves are often recommended when using recreational equipment that has wheels.
